

THE FOUR WEEKS OF THE ADVENT SEASON

THE ADVENT WREATH

THE SEASON OF ADVENT is a time of waiting as we prepare out hearts and lives for the coming of the Christ child. Using the Advent wreath and its candles is a way that many Christians celebrate Advent at church and in their homes. Advent wreaths typically include three purple candles and one pink candle on a circular wreath of greenery to depict the four weeks of Advent. A white candle, located in the center of the wreath, is called the Christ candle.

- November 29 The First Sunday of Advent We light the first purple candle, which signifies HOPE, because Advent is a time of waiting and hoping.
- December 6 The Second Sunday of Advent
 We re-light the first candle, then light the second purple
 candle, because Advent is a time to celebrate God's LOVE
 given to us.
- December 13 The Third Sunday of Advent
 We re-light the first two candles, then light the pink candle,
 in celebration of the JOY found in our Savior and in our
 salvation.
- December 20 The Fourth Sunday of Advent
 We re-light the first three candles, then light the last purple
 candle, which signifies the PEACE we find when we lean
 into the presence of God.
- December 25 Christmas Day
 We re-light the four candles around the wreath, then light
 the white candle in the center, the CHRIST candle, to
 celebrate the waiting is over and the Christ child is born.

Several students in our Youth group have pre-recorded candle-lighting devotions for each Sunday of Advent. You may access them on our website (www.madisonfumc.com/Advent2020) to lead your family when you light the candles of the Advent wreath in your home.

THE WORD BECAME FLESH

WHERE ARE YOU?

When I read this Bible story as a child, I often felt so sorry for Adam and Eve. I felt like they were "in trouble" with God because they disobeyed His very specific command. What do I want to avoid revealing to God? He is always by our side — with arms open wide — showing mercy, compassion, and forgiveness to those who choose to seek Him. What a gift of grace!

NOTHING IS IMPOSSIBLE WITH GOD

My dad has read this passage to us on Christmas Eve since I was a little girl. Mary was a young teenage girl, single, without any real social status. Can you imagine how she must have felt when Gabriel declared that she would soon become pregnant with the Son of God? Mary was given one of the greatest honors and privileges one can receive. She could have easily turned it down, but she knew God would not give her anything she could not handle.

When I think about how Mary felt, my own role as a mother comes to mind. Mary relied on God's grace and His plan for her. There have been many times in my life that I have been faced with challenges and given tasks that I felt I could not handle. As a mother of twins, I face something new each day. I think it takes a lot of grace, patience, and reliance on God to be a parent. I pray daily that I am doing the right things for my girls. I rely on my faith in God to get through the not-so-fun days. I know God would not have blessed AJ and me with twins if He knew we could not handle it.

This passage shows us Mary's faith in God. Just like her, we know that nothing is impossible when we put our trust in Him.

LIVING FAITH

This passage describes the mystery around which our entire faith is built. The Virgin Mary becomes pregnant and her faithful husband does not understand as they have not yet "come together." One can only assume his first reaction to this news! I don't think anyone would fault him for wanting to abandon her and leave her to her shame — after all, she has broken their marriage covenant and brought humiliation to her husband.

Joseph is a man of compassion, however, and does not wish to disgrace Mary. After all, he loves her! What a maelstrom of emotion he must have felt! Through his faith and willingness to obey the Lord, Joseph rears Jesus as his own and does not question his legitimacy. Joseph's ultimate decision to surrender to the Holy Spirit impacts us eternally.

God sends us opportunities to "love like Joseph" regularly. When was the last time you embraced the chance to love someone whom society has cast out? Who has the Lord placed in your path? Stay open to each chance God gives you to show grace and love to those who may not otherwise experience His tenderness and mercy.

The weight of their burdens would soon be lifted in an unimaginable way.

I would venture to say 2020 has been heavy for many of us. At times, I have struggled to carry its weight. Covid is heavy, racial injustice is heavy, politics are heavy, separation is heavy. Are you ready for a little air? I sure am. Luke 2:1-5 gives me hope for things to come. The scene is set, the weight will soon be lifted.

Mary and Joseph's hard journey ultimately revealed what mattered. This year has reminded me of what really matters — faith, hope and love — God, family, and joy in everyday life. This Christmas season, let's remember what matters and not let the weight of 2020 slow us down in spreading the bright light of Christ.
